"The Johor police contingent have their Men in Black and we have our own team of Men in Sunglasses. The squad was formed two years ago," said Rahim.

He said of the 2,140 litterbugs caught so far this year, 1,533 were locals, 150 Singaporeans and the

rest Bangladeshis, Indonesians, Nepalese and Pakistanis.

"We will increase operations to nab litterbugs in areas under our jurisdiction and will not compromise with them," he added.

Hotspots monitored include areas such as downtown Johor Baru, JB Bazaar, JB Sentral, Larkin Sentral

bus terminal, Stulang Laut and the Customs, Immigration and Quarantine Complex.

The compound notices are issued and collected on the spot by squad members. Students are fined RM20 while adults and tourists have to pay RM50 under MBJB's Anti-littering By-Law 1981.
